1 <u>HBO's 'The Pitt' inspires viewers to consider organ donation, end-of-life planning</u> WBOG Country 101.3; by Ozzy; 10/28/25

A University of Southern California study reveals HBO's Emmy-winning *The Pitt* motivates viewers toward organ donation and end-of-life preparations. Research examining two multi-episode storylines shows 26.9% of surveyed audiences sought organ donation information while 17.2% shared donation details with others. The organ donation narrative particularly resonated with Black viewers, a demographic overrepresented on transplant waiting lists yet underrepresented as donors. Concerning end-of-life planning, 38.8% of viewers pursued additional information and 15.3% distributed relevant resources.

5 Trends in state palliative care legislation across the US

More than 13.7 million people in the US could benefit from palliative care. Yet, access is uneven due to workforce shortages, low public awareness, variability in service availability, and federal delays. Although states play a pivotal role in shaping health policy, the extent of their legislative efforts regarding palliative care is unknown. Using data from the Palliative Care Law and Policy GPS, a database developed by the Yale Solomon Center for Health Law and Policy in partnership with the Center to Advance Palliative Care, we examined trends in the introduction and enactment of state-level palliative legislation, categorized legislative content, and mapped distribution across states and regions from 2009 to 2023... States introduced 819 pieces of legislation during the study period, peaking in 2018. States most frequently introduced quality/standards, public awareness, and payment policies. States that introduced the most legislation included Massachusetts with 111 pieces, New York with 72, and New Jersey with 61.

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### 6 Medicare finalizes controversial cut to specialty care next year

The CMS finalized the Medicare physician fee schedule for 2026 on Friday [10/31], one day before the statutory deadline. Medicare has locked in a controversial pay cut for specialty doctors next year, normalizing reimbursement between specialists and primary care doctors and curbing the influence of a powerful physician association in setting rates. ... The -2.5% adjustment is meant to account for non-time-based services becoming more efficient over time as technology improves and workflows become smoother. As a result, they're easier to perform, so Medicare is overpaying, regulators say.

National Alliance CEO Steve Landers on hospices' top policy priorities

Medicare advantage and telehealth are key hospice policy priorities for the National Alliance for Care at Home. On the home health front, the organization is also embroiled in efforts to stave off proposed payment and Medicaid cuts. The Alliance came into being last year with the merger between the National Hospice and Palliative Care Organization and the National Association for Home Care & Hospice. Hospice News spoke with Alliance CEO Dr. Steven Landers about how the two legacy organizations are integrating, the hospice public policy landscape and how providers can get involved at a grass roots level.

Early lessons learned implementing the dementia-focused GUIDE model

At NAACOS meeting, Bluestone ACO's Nate Hunkins, M.P.H., described how GUIDE care

navigators are complementing its advanced primary care model. Key highlights:

 The GUIDE Model focuses on longitudinal, condition-specific dementia care involving care navigators, clinical and community services, and caregiver support to improve patient outcomes.

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- Challenges include staffing complexities, patient resistance due to stigma, and the need for clear communication to build trust and ensure enrollment in the program.
- Effective integration of GUIDE services requires careful alignment with existing care models to avoid unnecessary costs and maximize value for patients and providers.

### States' promising practices to improve care of serious illness

### What Express Scripts's move to eliminate rebates means for the industry

In an unparalleled move, Express Scripts announced plans to get rid of a key part of US drug pricing: rebates. The pharmacy benefit manager (PBM), which is owned by health insurance giant Cigna, announced in late October that its Cigna Healthcare plans will adopt a "rebate-free" model for fully insured members beginning in 2027, and the model will become the standard for all its Evernorth pharmacy benefit clients in 2028. Publisher's note: This appears to be a step in the right direction regarding medication pricing reform. It will be interesting to monitor the details and timeline.

### 13 Hospital-at-home programs gripped by uncertainty

That deal had been delayed by an investigation and lawsuit by the U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ).

### 15 <u>Linden Capital Partners has acquired Agape Care Group</u>

The private equity firm Linden Capital Partners has acquired hospice provider Agape Care Group from Ridgemont Equity Partners for an undisclosed amount. ... Agape Care Group did not immediately respond to Hospice News' inquiries about the transaction. Agape's more than 2,100 employees provide hospice and palliative care to over 5,700 patients daily across 10 states. Agape's previous owner, Ridgemont Equity Partners, acquired the company from the private equity firm the Vistria Group in 2019.

### Hospice workers call for Gov. Hochul to sign bill restricting for-profit hospices

**California bans AI chatbots from posing as licensed health providers** 26 Medscape; by Steph Weber; 10/30/25

California has drawn a hard line on how artificial intelligence (AI) chatbots represent themselves to consumers, banning the tools from implying they are licensed medical providers such as MDs and psychotherapists... "Everything keeps changing, so it's hard to be definitive," John Torous, MD, MBI, psychiatrist and director of the Digital Psychiatry Division in the Department of Psychiatry at Beth Israel Deaconess Medical Center, Boston, told Medscape Medical News. "But there's certainly concern that some Al chatbots are marketing directly to children and minors, and there's direct evidence that some will actually pull up a fake medical license number." ... "[T]he model by default should not provide instructions about how to commit suicide, but if an adult user is asking for help writing a fictional story that depicts a suicide, the model should help with that request," Sam Altman, OpenAl CEO, said in a blog post on the company's website in September. He added that the platform aims to "[extend] freedom as far as possible without causing harm or undermining anyone else's freedom." Publisher's note: AI regulatory lines are blurry and far behind advancements.

Al has been the sixth most-cited reason for U.S. job cuts so far in 2025, but the No. 2 cause of layoffs in October, Challenger, Gray & Christmas <u>found</u>. ### Estimating the number of services & patients receiving specialized palliative care globally in 2025

In 2025, the estimated number of specialized palliative care service delivery teams worldwide reached approximately 33,700 - representing a 35.6% increase from the 25,000 identified in 2017. Service delivery expanded across all WHO regions. The estimated number of patients served rose from almost 7 million in 2017 to approximately 10.4 million in 2025. This figure represents roughly 14% of the total global need for palliative car e. ...Despite notable growth in service availability, significant disparities persist, particularly in low- and middle-income countries.

### What matters about what matters most

The authors note that "Identifying what matters is essential for providing personcentered care, guiding clinical visits, tailoring care plans, and providing a starting point to foster further patient engagement." These are lofty expectations of a single, simple question ["what matters most?"]. While the what matters question alone cannot guide

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care planning or tailor interventions, it can serve as a starting point for ongoing conversations about patient health goals and care preferences. These priorities, in turn, can guide patient-centered decision-making and care. The question also provides an opportunity to get to know the patients we care for as individuals. That, in itself, is an invaluable gift reminiscent of a period when clinicians had more time with patients and cared for them over years.

### A strategic path forward for hospice & palliative care: Ira Byock, Kristi Newport, Brynn Bowman

In June of 2025, hospice and palliative care pioneer Ira Byock published a white paper outlining the urgent challenges facing the field today. In a nutshell, he expressed concerns that the quality of hospice care in the United States has become highly variable, with disturbing frequency of unethical practices and avaricious owners. He also raised concern that the rapid increase in palliative care program growth during the first two decades of this century has stalled, leaving us with understaffed programs that are often inadequately trained. Along with Ira, we've invited Kristi Newport, a palliative care doctor and Chief Medical Officer of the American Academy of Hospice and Palliative Medicine, and Brynn Bowman, Chief Executive Officer of the Center to Advance Palliative Care, to discuss these issues and outline a strategic path forward for the field. In particular we talk about Ira's four-part solution to transform the field and restore its integrity: (1) publishing clear clinical and programmatic standards, (2) making meaningful data publicly available to ensure transparency and accountability, (3) fostering quality-based competition among providers, and (4) embracing the authentic brand of hospice and palliative care—expert care that alleviates suffering and fosters well-being.
